Intended outcome:

Look closely at similarities, differences, patterns and change.

Know about similarities and differences between themselves and others.

Proposed learning opportunities:

Continuing to observe changes in the environment linked to seasonal changes. Exploring the dark in the Role Play, experimenting with torches and lanterns. Linked to stories about the dark.

Finding out which animals come out at night.

Creating an animal habitat in the outdoor environment.

Exploring celebrations and beliefs including Diwali, Remembrance Day and Christmas.

Proposed learning opportunities:

Begin to recognise and use letter sounds within their play.

Co-operative play in the home corner.

Continue developing 'Special Person' each day, talking about ourselves and each other positively.

Physical Development: Proposed opportunities:

Practise letter formation using different sensory techniques.
Activities to develop fine motor skills including using tweezers.
Use music and movement to recreate falling and shooting stars.
Practising throwing and catching skills. Finding out about keeping ourselves safe and healthy through Road Safety
