You can begin by listening to the story. We've suggested these follow up activities to consolidate a range of reading, writing and creative skills previously taught in school.

Valentines

Decorate a biscuit for someone special this Valentine's day. For a quick and easy option grab a digestive biscuit, a little bit of icing and some sprinkles to decorate. Or you could be more adventurous and make your own biscuits or cakes using a recipe!





Wolf Puppet

I wonder if you know any other stories which have a wolf in them? Could you make a wolf puppet using resources you already have in your house and retell a story to yor family? Or you could use your imagination and tell your own story...



Amazing Algorithms

Watch the song 'This is the way we get dressed'.

https://youtu.be/1GDFa-nEzlg We use an algorithm (set of instructions) to get ready correctly every day.

Using the 'Getting Dressed routine cards' cut out and ask your child to place them in the correct order.

What happens if you put them in the wrong order?



Alternatively (without pictures) ask your child to draw a picture of themselves and some clothes e.g., a vest, pants, top, jumper, trousers, shoes etc, cut them out and put them on in the correct order.

Toss a Pancake Challenge

Using a one minute timer. Find out how many times you can toss a cardboard pancake in one minute. Record results on a simple tally chart.
